It has been a busy time at the U.S. Supreme Court. There have been several headline-grabbing decisions in recent days that have caused lots of conversation.

First, there was one decision that declared unconstitutional a key provision of the Voting Rights Act that required Federal oversight of changes to laws that affect someone's right to vote in parts of the country where there had been a pattern of laws that barred eligible people from voting. Many of these jurisdictions that needed to pre-clear legislative changes with the Justice Department were in the South, where patterns of discrimination against people of color were a problem when the bill was first passed. The Justices said that the "strong medicine" of Federal oversight had outlived its usefulness, although Chief Justice Roberts wrote "voting discrimination still exists; no one doubts that." However, he went on to question whether disparate treatment of states was still necessary, and this was the underpinning of the decision.

Second, there were two decisions relating to marriage rights for gay and lesbian people. The first struck down a portion of the Defense of Marriage Act, which denied Federal benefits for gay persons who were legally married and live in the 13 states which permit marriage of same-sex partners. The majority opinion cited Federalism – that states have the right to chart their own course – but also cited issues of fairness and equal treatment. In the majority opinion, Justice Kennedy wrote "DOMA singles out a class of persons deemed by a State entitled to recognition and protection to enhance their own liberty. It imposes a disability on the class by refusing to acknowledge a status the State finds to be dignified and proper. .. The federal statute is invalid, for no legitimate purpose overcomes the purpose and effect to disparage and to injure those whom the State, by its marriage laws, sought to protect in personhood and dignity. "

The other decision on same-sex marriage struck down California's Proposition 8, which sought to bar same-sex marriages in that state. A simplistic view of the decision was that those who advocated for Prop 8 had no legal standing to do so – they were simply activists with a particular point of view.

That's the legal stuff. But what about the theological view?

Here I turn to the Baptismal Covenant. We promise that, with God's help, we will "strive for justice and peace, and respect the dignity of every human being." There are no exceptions. Not for people who look different than us, not for people who are in same sex relationships, not for people who believe differently than us. No exceptions.

I suspect that some of us at Epiphany have different opinions about these Supreme Court decisions. That is a fact of humanity – we see things differently, we have different life experiences, we have particular opinions. But one thing unites us in the wake of these decisions: we have promised to respect the dignity of every human being. That's a big promise. I pray that we can put that promise ahead of our fears and our hopes, our concerns and confusions, and simply offer other human beings the same rights, respect, and – dare I say it – love that we ourselves hope for. In the only court that will matter in the end, when we stand before our Lord, let us be able to say "I respected the dignity of EVERY human being, not just the ones with whom I felt comfortable."

Work has prevented me from attending the past two months of the Women's Chapter 12 meetings. I have missed the fellowship and opportunity to spend time with the others so I am looking forward to our July meeting. Fortunately the meetings are structured in such a way that we can come and go as necessary, and still be able to step right in; so even if you have not had an opportunity to attend one of our session yet, please stop by the first Wednesday of the month and join us.

The past few weeks have seemed to be hard for me. I have been discontent at work feeling overwhelmed and under appreciated, and found a new leak in the condo during the deluge of rain we had. I know we all go through this at times and we each have our own way of coping during our struggles. Growing up with two grandfathers that were Episcopal priest lead to a lot of talks about Jesus, his sacrifice for us, the bible and religion in general. My Grandfather Loving became a minister out of college and preached until the day he died from a heart attack during a wedding ceremony. My Grandfather Henderson was a civil engineer building bridges with a firm in Boston until he was 65. Then he entered the seminary and preached his last sermon on his 100th birthday; a very generous gift from the bishop since he did not always keep his place or train of thought by then.

So I grew up with grandfathers of the same faith and similar callings who took different paths. But the one thing they had in common was a bible verse that they loved and turned to in their times of struggle. I guess you could say this was handed down to me because I too have a bible verse that I turn to when I need help. Although there are many versus that I turn to such as Psalm 23 and also Psalm 51.10 Create in me a clean heart, my almost daily mantra, there is one verse I turn to time and time again, Jeremiah 29.11 *For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future.* Last week when I was down this verse kept showing up in the most unexpected places. On a book mark one of my vendors gave me, in a book I was reading, and twice in daily devotionals. It is in times like that when I feel God's presence most. He knows what that verse means to me and when I needed it most he placed it where I would see it, not once but numerous times. This week has been a better week and I am back on track, but that verse still goes with me in my heart and I know when I need encouragement just where to look.

Vestry Highlights

The Vestry convened in the Parlor on June 11th. After our Scripture study and check-in, we reviewed our finances. We are in good shape, with a deficit of \$8913. We approved the Outreach budget and talked about funding priorities for the next years' budget. We were happy to hear that Kim Ludwig has agreed to serve as Finance Committee chair, following Darel Gallagher into that important role. We are grateful for Darel's service. The audit team has begun our annual audit and should have it completed in August, to meet the canonical requirements.

We set up the schedule for the Stewardship Campaign. Kickoff will be on October 6th, the ingathering will be on October 20th, and the Congregational meeting will be on November 10th.

The Sunday School teachers are looking at fresh ideas for Sunday School curriculum, and have invited Judy Davis, our summer seminarian, to brainstorm with them. ShrineMont plans are moving forward after a successful yard sale, and there will be some new activities for the parish retreat this year.

We were excited by Harrison's yoga program, which has been quite popular, and Judy Davis' work with us.

We discussed what kinds of gifts we have in the Vestry and what kinds of gifts we might be on the lookout for when identifying potential new vestry members. Vestry will also participate in providing coffee hours throughout the year. We shared lists of parishioners and vestry contacts were assigned to each vestry member.

The meeting ended with a prayer at 9 p.m. The next Vestry meeting will be on Tuesday, July 9th, after the Vestry provides dinner to the Caritas guests.

CARITAS WEEK, JULY 6TH - 13TH

Epiphany and Emmanuel-Brookhill are again hosting the CARITAS shelter at Epiphany during the week of July 6-13. Teams have been formed to prepare and serve the dinner meal each night. The outreach committee has allotted funding for purchase of most breakfast and lunch items.

On Saturday morning, July 6th, the truck bearing cots and personal belongings tubs will be delivered to Epiphany at approximately 10:45 a.m. An Epiphany group will unload the truck and set-up cots in the church hall. Our guests will arrive each day sometime between 5:30 – 6:00 p.m. and leave by 6:30 a.m. each morning. This year we will have a group of 30-35 females.

The breakfast and lunch items will be placed in kitchen area each night for the next day's mealtime. The dinner preparers will serve dinner meal and make sandwiches for the next day's lunch and pack lunch bags with non-perishable items.

Dinner will be served at approximately 6:00-6:30 p.m. Every other night a group of guests will be driven to the "Y" for showers or to the laundry mat for clothes washing. Transportation will be needed for this venue. Quarters, detergent, towels and washcloths will be donated by Emmanuel group. Emmanuel will coordinate the runs to the "Y" for showers, while Epiphany will coordinate runs to the laundry mat after dinner.

Epiphany will be responsible for dinner meals Saturday-Tuesday and breakfast and lunch Sunday-Wednesday. Emmanuel (with the help of St. James the Less and Mt. Olive Baptist Church) will be responsible for dinner meals Wednesday-Friday and breakfast and lunch Thursday – Saturday.

Each night one person is scheduled to spend the night in the parlor to just be there during the night in case any issues arise and set out breakfast items and lunch bags for that morning. A CARITAS group leader will stay with the guests in the church hall.

Emmanuel will have a group at Epiphany to load up the truck with cots and personal belongings tubs at 11:30 a.m.

Items still needed: bottled water (48) and hard-boiled eggs (36) are needed for each day. People to just come and interact with our guests are also needed. You will find they are just like you and I, but are temporarily homeless for one reason or another.
