

It feels like not too long ago, our parish office was bursting with donated diapers for our adopted Christmas family. From that outpouring of generosity, the Epiphany Diaper Bag ministry was born. Over the last several months, we have been providing free diapers to people in need in our community.

We began this work thanks to a Mustard Seed Grant from the Diocese, a portion of our outreach budget, and other parish fundraisers. We have recently received an additional \$5,000 from the Diocese in the form of a Peter James Lee Small Church Revitalization Grant. This money will help to support our ongoing outreach and diaper ministry. We have also continued to raise money and receive support from the parish chapters. Thank you to everyone who has contributed, both with their time and donations.

This ministry has grown faster than we ever expected. Clearly, we have identified an urgent need for families in our area. We distribute diapers every month, on the third Saturday of the month. Our doors are open from 10 am to noon.

Over the months, we have learned a lot about what works and does not work. I believe we have finally struck upon the best system for getting the diapers packed and out to the people who need them most.

If you have not already volunteered for one of these distribution days, I want to encourage you to consider signing up. It is such a joy to meet the people we are serving. Often parents with their children come together. It is so rewarding to see the positive impact our parish is having in their lives.

Thank you again for all your hard work and support of this important ministry. I hope you all have the opportunity to experience it first hand.

## "Voice from the Pew"

Having grown up in a very small Parish and attending the 8:15 service, I was no stranger to participating in the worship service. After attending the 8:15 service for about a month, Pete Whitlock and Chuck Strabley approached me with an offer I couldn't refuse. Armed with a key to open the church and strict instructions on coffee preparation, I was a newly minted 8:15 usher. No problem. I'm an early riser, enjoy greeting everyone, and like drinking coffee. Sometime later Ann Schaefer asked if I would like to read at the 8:15 service. I wouldn't "like" to read, but said yes out of a sense of duty. Public speaking is something I've had to do but has always filled me with dread. I approached reading at the 8:15 service like every other time I've formally spoken in front of a group, soldier on and it will be over soon enough. After all, the 8:15 bunch can be a raucous crowd! As the years went by, I became more and more comfortable and actually began to enjoy reading at the 8:15 service. Reading Saint Paul's seemingly never ending run on sentences was no longer intimidating and I began to pronounce Old Testament names with confidence, knowing that just about everybody was as unsure of the correct pronunciation as I was! Preparing also forces me to think and reflect upon the message, which is precisely the point of reading Scripture. A few years ago, Father Andrew asked if I would read the 22<sup>nd</sup> Psalm while the altar was being stripped on Maundy Thursday. I've always found Maundy Thursday to be a challenging service and the 22<sup>nd</sup> Psalm poignantly captures the emotions of that service. From the depths of despair of "My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?" to the promise of hope of "For he does not despise nor abhor the poor in their poverty; neither does he hide his face from them; but when they cry to him he hears them"; it is difficult to read without being overcome with emotion. It has been my privilege to read that Psalm for the past few years and have grown spiritually because of it. Now for the point I'd like to make. Step outside of your comfort zone and try something that is intimidating or uncomfortable. You may just find that what you once feared or disliked provides growth that you could not have achieved otherwise. Now I need to work on that foot washing thing.....

The Finance and Stewardship Committee is happy to announce that we not only met this goal before Easter 2019, but with all of your generous donations, we passed the amount to match the \$45,000. The fund will allow us to do several things to strengthen the church for the future and to support our mission, ministry, budget, building and grounds of the church. With the help of donations, volunteers, proceeds from our ReStore and sweat equity from our partner families, we're making the dream of home ownership possible in the Greater Richmond area.

## OUR MISSION

Seeking to put God's love into action, Richmond Metropolitan Habitat for Humanity brings people together to build homes, communities, and hope.

## OUR HOMEOWNERS

Earn between 30% – 80% of the Area Median Income. The numbers vary depending on family size. Average AMI for Richmond Habitat homeowners is 49%. Have a need for housing--are living in substandard housing or an unsafe environment; are overcrowded, cost burdened, or in need of handicap accessibility; or cannot qualify for a traditional mortgage. Perform Sweat Equity. Sweat Equity is required volunteer hours that are obtained through working on their home and the homes of others in our program, working at our ReStores, and attending classes and one-on-one budgeting meetings. Attend 10 monthly financial and homeownership classes.

## OUR IMPACT

Since 1986, we have built and rehabbed more than 350 homes and completed 53 critical home repairs in the Greater Richmond area. In fiscal year 2018, we provided 10 families with affordable homes that will improve lives for generations to come. Since 2013, we have served 5 veteran families through Habitat for Heroes and 9 veteran families through our Repair Corps program. In fiscal year 2018, we mobilized 3,163 construction & ReStore volunteers to fill 6,025 spots for a total of 33,577 volunteer hours donated to support our mission.

## Care Notes:

The Church of the Epiphany has a Parish Nurse Ministry. The parish nurse ministry provides health education and advocacy and promotes healing of body, mind and spirit. The mission of the parish nurse ministry is to promote a healthier faith community through spiritual support and healthier life choices, while supporting ministries already in place within the church. A Parish Nurse DOES NOT perform invasive procedures, such as wound/dressing changes, blood draws, injections, etc.


This month's topic is concerning **summer safety**. As the warmer month's approach, everyone enjoys spending more time outdoors. That means being safety conscious as the thermometer rises on these warm Virginia summer days. Wearing loose fitting, light colored clothing helps to repel the heat. Additionally, wearing a wide brimmed hat to protect the face from the sun is helpful. Applying a sunscreen with a high rated sun protection factor (SPF) is important. An SPF of 30 is a good number to use. Did you know that sunburn can actually slow down the ability of the skin to cool itself? Make sure to stay indoors during the hottest times of the day. The best time to be outdoors for activities such as yard work or exercise is early morning or late evening when the temperatures are at their lowest. Drink plenty of water to stay hydrated, unless you have kidney disease, heart disease or a disease process that your physician advises you to limit your fluid intake. Always check with your physician if you are unsure. Avoid drinking alcoholic beverages or caffeine in the heat as these can constrict the blood vessels that are near the skin and in turn reduces the amount of heat the body is able to release. Make sure to always provide fresh cool water for your pet and never leave your pet in a closed vehicle unattended. And of course, never leave your child in a closed vehicle. The temperature in a closed vehicle can quickly exceed temperatures of 140 degrees (National Weather Service, 2019). Small children especially have very sensitive skin and need protection from the heat and sun.
