

THE VIEW FROM MY WINDOW...

We enter into the season of Lent wondering what we can do to make this time of reflection, penitence and preparation a holy season. In the past few years, we talked about the kinds of spiritual disciplines that assist us in this task. This year, I'd suggest we do something different.

Let's call it a spatial discipline. Spatial as in space - the space around us.

Is there space around us to move, to breathe, to pray? Or are our spaces so cluttered that there is no opportunity to do anything but carefully navigate the narrow pathways? Are we weighed down by the things that take up space?

One kind of space-hog that might trip us up is material goods that are no longer useful to us. Old piles of National Geographic magazines, rubber bands filling up an entire drawer, canned goods past their "use by" date. Clothes that are now too small, or too large. File folders with our children's homework from 1962. Our pat answer to why we keep them is that we might use them or need them someday. That someday we might go looking for them and wish they were available to us. But realistically, we don't go back and re-read the old magazines. If we can once again fit into the sizes of those old clothes, we realize that styles have changed and we no longer would want to be seen in them. Rubber bands get brittle and unusable over time.

Some of these things might have use for someone else. Clothes that are clean and sound but that no longer fit can go to a charity clothes closet or to Goodwill Industries, where someone will be happy to get a nice pair of slacks at no or little cost. Extra kitchenware might help a family that is resettling in the area, when you give it to a charity which can distribute it. The same goes for furniture.

And what about things that are broken, when it would cost more to repair than to replace? Discard them. Charities cannot use them. You will not find someone to fix them. They are taking up space - physical space in your house, psychic space when you walk by the item and say, "I wish I didn't have to dust that silly thing."

Here's an idea for a spatial/spiritual practice during Lent: make more space in your home and in your soul. Once a week (or more if you find it particularly helpful), go through your house with a big garbage bag. For fifteen minutes (set a timer!), toss anything that can REALISTICALLY be donated to a charity like Purple Heart or Goodwill. By "realistically," I mean that it is something that is clean, functional, not in need of repair. Put the bag in the trunk of your car, and the next time you are driving up West Broad Street, drive up to Goodwill and drop it off. If you don't want to do a drop-off, some charities like Purple Heart will even come and pick up your goods. You are offering something useful to someone who needs it, and that is what the Lord expects us to do. As you release these items, say a silent prayer: "May this be useful to someone today."

Part two of this Lenten practice is another Fifteen Minute Fling (tip of the hat to the FlyLady, who teaches decluttering on her website, www.flylady.net) with another garbage bag. Walk around the house for fifteen minutes, and discard anything that

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you cannot donate that you haven't used in a year (or two years, if necessary). This could be broken small appliances, clothes that are stained or torn and cannot be fixed, old shoes, canned goods that have passed their expiration date, old magazines, virtually dead potted plants. Just fifteen minutes. Toss the bag in the garbage can.

There's a spiritual reason why we should do this. When we cling to our stuff, it's a sign that we think we can be in control of all eventualities if we just have the right goods in hand. We are not trusting that the God who created us and loves us will look out for us. It's just plain foolish to think that we are in control. God is, and God has promised us that our cares and concerns are God's. All the piles of material goods in the world will not protect us.

What do we really need? Probably not as much as we think, and most certainly not as much as we already have, clogging up our rooms and tabletops and our bookshelves. Let go, so that there will be more room for God in your life.

Then I fell upon an idea that I am sure is not original but I think may be easier for me to stick to. I am going to use the days in Lent to start a new devotional series and just spending more time in the presence of God. With my work schedule and all the little things I find time for, I rarely put aside even a few minutes to really sit and just be with God. So this Lent I am setting the clock a little earlier and using the additional time for devotion and prayer. Yes I may be giving up a little sleep or as is more often a little extra lounging in the bed time, but I think the reward will be well worth the effort and I won't be sneaking little bites of chocolate hoping no one catches me.

Save the Date!!

Did you know...

....that our current campus is actually the fifth location of the Church of the Epiphany? This parish started as a gathering of several men in who were meeting for Bible study in each other's homes in 1890, in the Barton Heights neighborhood. When the parish was formed, the church's first home was at in that neighborhood. In 1929, a church was built at 2900 Hanes Avenue, off Brookland Parkway, and the church grew and thrived there. In 1951, conversations began about establishing a mission in Lakeside. In 1952 the mission was established, using Lakeside Elementary School as the facility. In 1955 the first building was begun in our current location - this is now our Parish Hall. The two congregations (Hanes Avenue and Lakeside Mission) combined in 1959. In 1967, we built the sanctuary building, where we currently worship, and in 2004 we built the connecting structure between the Parish Hall and the Sanctuary. This is where the nursery, offices, handicapped-accessible bathrooms, the music room, the parlor, and the new kitchen are. Churches and church buildings grow to meet the changing needs of the congregation and the community - we don't know what will be next, but we do know that as the people of God, our church is a place where we learn about God's love and live into sharing it with the world. Thanks be to God for all who have built this place!

Caring Meals

Several years ago, I came home from spending a long day at the hospital with my Mother. I was so tired I could hardly think. I felt hungry, but I could not even think clear enough to stop at any of the fast food places I had passed. When I pulled into my drive way, one of my neighbors came over and gave me a plate of food. She said she knew I was too tired to cook, so she made a plate of food from their leftover dinner. I don't even remember what the meal was, I just know it really lifted my spirits and satisfied my hunger.

At Epiphany, we often have members who have a need for Caring Meals. It may be a family member is in the hospital or someone is at home sick or there has been a death in the family. In situations like this, cooking a meal has a very low priority on the list of things the family needs to do.

A Caring Meal can be something you cook yourself. You can double the dinner you cook one night and put the extra in the freezer. When you make a casserole, make two and freeze one. If you have no time to cook, a rotisserie chicken and a few prepared vegetables from the grocery store make a good meal. A takeout pizza and some salad are always a favorite. Any type of meal shows the recipient that we care about them and want to support them.

THE RT. REV. SUSAN E. GOFF

The Rt. Rev. Susan E. Goff is bishop suffragan of the Diocese of Virginia. She first joined the Bishop's staff as Canon to the Ordinary in January 2010, overseeing the day-to-day operations of various Episcopal ministries, including discernment and ordination processes for the diocese; misconduct prevention and responses; the Title IV ecclesiastical discipline canons; and the transition process for clergy and congregations.

Bishop Goff was consecrated on July 28, 2012. As bishop suffragan, she oversees mission churches, in addition to multicultural and ethnic ministries.

Bishop Goff came to the diocesan staff from St. Christopher's, Springfield, where she served as rector for 15 years. In addition to her work at St. Christopher's, she served as an adjunct instructor in liturgics at Virginia Theological Seminary. Prior to St. Christopher's, Bishop Goff served as rector at Immanuel, Old Church, as chaplain of St. Catherine's School, Richmond and as chaplain of St. Margaret's School, Tappahannock. During her 31 years in ordained ministry in the Diocese of Virginia, she was a deputy to three General conventions, served on the Standing Committee for two terms, was dean of two regions and chaired or was a member of numerous diocesan committees and task groups. Bishop Goff earned her master of divinity degree, with distinction, from Union Theological Seminar in New York City. While a seminarian, she directed Eagle's Nest, the summer camp of the Diocese of Newark, for three summers. During a two-year leave of absence from the seminary, she lived and worked among the Arapaho people as a missionary on the Wind River Indian Reservation in Wyoming. Bishop Goff is married to the Rev. C. Thomas Holliday, an interim ministry specialist who has served numerous churches in the Diocese of Virginia.



