### **FIRST READING:** Joel 2:1-2, 12-17

BLOW THE TRUMPET in Zion; sound the alarm on my holy mountain! Let all the inhabitants of the land tremble, for the day of the Lord is coming, it is near—a day of darkness and gloom, a day of clouds and thick darkness! Like blackness spread upon the mountains a great and powerful army comes; their like has never been from of old, nor will be again after them in ages to come. Yet even now, says the Lord, return to me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; rend your hearts and not your clothing. Return to the Lord, your God, for he is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love, and relents from punishing. Who knows whether he will not turn and relent, and leave a blessing behind him, a grain offering and a drink offering for the Lord, your God? Blow the trumpet in Zion; sanctify a fast; call a solemn assembly; gather the people. Sanctify the congregation; assemble the aged; gather the children, even infants at the breast. Let the bridegroom leave his room, and the bride her canopy. Between the vestibule and the altar let the priests, the ministers of the Lord, weep. Let them say, "Spare your people, O Lord, and do not make your heritage a mockery, a byword among the nations. Why should it be said among the peoples, 'Where is their God?"

#### or Isaiah 58:1-12

SHOUT OUT, do not hold back! Lift up your voice like a trumpet! Announce to my people their rebellion, to the house of Jacob their sins. Yet day after day they seek me and delight to know my ways, as if they were a nation that practiced righteousness and

id not forsake the ordinance of their God; they ask of me righteous judgments, ney delight to draw near to God. "Why do we fast, but you do not see? Why umble ourselves, but you do not notice?" Look, you serve your own interest on our fast day, and oppress all your workers. Look, you fast only to quarrel and to ght and to strike with a wicked fist. Such fasting as you do today will not make our voice heard on high. Is such the fast that I choose, a day to humble oneself? it to bow down the head like a bulrush, and to lie in sackcloth and ashes? Will ou call this a fast, a day acceptable to the Lord? Is not this the fast that I choose: ) loose the bonds of injustice, to undo the thongs of the yoke, to let the oppressed o free, and to break every yoke? Is it not to share your bread with the hungry, and ring the homeless poor into your house; when you see the naked, to cover them, ad not to hide yourself from your own kin? Then your light shall break forth like 1e dawn, and your healing shall spring up quickly; your vindicator shall go before ou, the glory of the Lord shall be your rear guard. Then you shall call, and the ord will answer; you shall cry for help, and he will say, Here I am. If you remove 1e yoke from among you, the pointing of the finger, the speaking of evil, if you ffer your food to the hungry and satisfy the needs of the afflicted, then your light hall rise in the darkness and your gloom be like the noonday. The Lord will guide ou continually, and satisfy your needs in parched places, and make your bones rong; and you shall be like a watered garden, like a spring of water, whose waters ever fail. Your ancient ruins shall be rebuilt; you shall raise up the foundations f many generations; you shall be called the repairer of the breach, the restorer of reets to live in.

## Psalm 103 (or Psalm 103:8-14) from the Book of Common Prayer

Bless the LORD, O my soul, \* and all that is within me, bless his holy Name.

### SECOND READING: 2 Corinthians 5:20b-6:10

WE ENTREAT YOU on behalf of Christ, be reconciled to God. For our sake h made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the right teousness of God. As we work together with him, we urge you also not to accept the grace of God in vain. For he says, "At an acceptable time I have listened to you and on a day of salvation I have helped you." See, now is the acceptable time; see

now is the day of salvation! We are putting no obstacle in anyone's way, so that no famay be found with our ministry, but as servants of God we have commended oursel in every way: through great endurance, in afflictions, hardships, calamities, beatir imprisonments, riots, labors, sleepless nights, hunger; by purity, knowledge, patier kindness, holiness of spirit, genuine love, truthful speech, and the power of God; we the weapons of righteousness for the right hand and for the left; in honor and dishor in ill repute and good repute. We are treated as impostors, and yet are true; as a known, and yet are well known; as dying, and see—we are alive; as punished, and not killed; as sorrowful, yet always rejoicing; as poor, yet making many rich; as hav nothing, and yet possessing everything.

#### **GOSPEL:** Matthew 6:1-6, 16-21

JESUS SAID, "Beware of practicing your piety before others in order to be seen them; for then you have no reward from your Father in heaven. So whenever you g alms, do not sound a trumpet before you, as the hypocrites do in the synagogues a in the streets, so that they may be praised by others. Truly I tell you, they have receiv their reward. But when you give alms, do not let your left hand know what your ri hand is doing, so that your alms may be done in secret; and your Father who sees secret will reward you. And whenever you pray, do not be like the hypocrites; for tl love to stand and pray in the synagogues and at the street corners, so that they n be seen by others. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. But whenever y pray, go into your room and shut the door and pray to your Father who is in secret; a your Father who sees in secret will reward you. And whenever you fast, do not lo dismal, like the hypocrites, for they disfigure their faces so as to show others that tl are fasting. Truly I tell you, they have received their reward. But when you fast, put on your head and wash your face, so that your fasting may be seen not by others by your Father who is in secret; and your Father who sees in secret will reward y Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moth and rust consume ε where thieves break in and steal; but store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, wh neither moth nor rust consumes and where thieves do not break in and steal. For wh your treasure is, there your heart will be also."
